FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

This month we celebrate once again the festival of Pesach and the liberation of our ancestors from mental and physical enslavement. After two years of Zoom Seders and separation from our families and friends at our Seder tables, we are hopeful that this year we will be reunited for our Passover traditions. When we begin to turn the pages of the Haggadah and retell once again the story of the Exodus, we will see the evolution of the Jewish people from an enslaved people to a nascent nation learning how to express its own ambitions. At first, we see the Jewish people moaning and grumbling under the whips of their overseers, and later we see them singing out in joy. But it takes a while before we see them begin to speak. Like an infant that innately cries to express displeasure, the Jews first learned how to grumble. Only gradually did they learn how to express their emotions verbally. This manifested not infrequently in complaint and lack of patience. At other times it was seen through prayer and appreciation.

I remember distinctly so many moments form my March of the Living trip a few years ago. The deep pain and anguish our group felt as we traveled from one ghetto and concentration camp to another will stay with me probably forever. After a couple of days, I think my mind became numb to the experience and subconsciously I was trying to will my way through the rest of the trip. The final stop was Majdanek, and by the time our group arrived there, our minds had been transformed. We no longer had the words to express the deep pain we felt. Despite the lessons we learned about the Holocaust since childhood, walking through the killing fields of Poland was so vividly painful and cruel. I saw some members of our group lose their ability to formulate words to express their experience. I saw others reduced to grumbling. Still others were formulating complaints that had no bearing in reason or logic. All these reactions were coping mechanisms we were using to survive what we were witnessing.

Since that trip I read Exodus a bit differently. I try to imagine how the words of the Israelites were influenced by what they were experiencing. Their complaints now seem insignificant, but under the crack of the Egyptian whip or in the desolate wilderness with no water, perhaps the words they uttered were coping mechanisms to deal with their situation. I oftentimes hear complaints. I am a rabbi-that's part of the job. But sometimes the words do not match the desire; they match the situation. When I hear a complaint, I try not to overreact to the dissatisfaction expressed verbally. I endeavor to understand the milieu from which the complaint arose. Sometimes people say hurtful things to us that they really don't mean. And we are offended. But before we give up on or cancel the speaker, we might consider where they are coming from and what is really bothering them. The Israelites complained a lot in the wilderness, but that's because the experience was new and scary. By the time they realized where they were going and why, they had invented a whole new language of blessing and gratitude.

It is Monday, March 7, and I cried three times before 9:00 a.m.

As the sanctuary began to fill up at our first all-elementary school havdallah gathering in two years, with our kindergarteners able to sit for the first time with their 5th grade buddies; with our parents able to come and sing and pray with their children; with the pure joy felt by the teachers and staff; Ella P., a second grade student, came up to give me a baggie with homemade cookies that she had made and sold at Joanna's Marketplace on Sunday to raise money to help the children in Ukraine. She told me proudly that she raised over \$800. Ella is eight years old and already looks at the world, sees its brokenness and asks: What can I do? And, already at eight, she knows that she can do something-that she is powerful.

Then, two of our 5th grade students stood up to teach the Rambam elementary school about the Torah portion. They spoke beautifully and taught beautiful lessons. And then one of the students, Ashley F., spoke about how her friends are her sacred community, and that the girl standing next to her, Isabelle Sachar, has been her friend since early childhood and has always been there for her. The scholarship was outstanding, but even more so was the love and kindness modeled by these two amazing 5th graders.

Then, Jack F., five years old, told me that he made bracelets and lemonade and sold them to help the children at Tikvah Children's Home in Odessa find safety. He raised \$700, and his parents had

promised to match what he raised dollar for dollar.

Yesterday, I had the pleasure of being with our religious school 2nd grade families as their children began to learn their Hebrew letters by making name plaques for their bedroom doors. My heart swelled as I got to hear the parents share why they came to Beth Am, why they joined the religious school-and that each shared about their deep love of Judaism, and their deep sense of having a second home here at Beth Am.

While my heart is broken when I read and listen to news from Ukraine, my heart is full when I look at our congregation.

This is Beth Am. A place to learn. A place that grows menschen. A place that will hold you when you're sad. A place that will dance with you as you celebrate. A place to pour out your heart in prayer. A place to find and build community. A place that will embrace you as you are and push you to grow. A place to celebrate gifts. A place to use those gifts to make the world a better place.

And yes, a place to cry-out of sadness as well as pride and joy.

M E S S A G E FROM THE P R E S I D E N T

I learned recently that my father's family came from Odessa, in Ukraine. Who knew? My ancestors lived like Tevya from *Fiddler on the Roof*! That way of life is long gone. But life today for many Jews in Ukraine is still being threatened, even though Ukraine is one of the only countries outside of Israel with a Jewish head-of-state.

Jews worldwide are taking action to help. Jewish agencies in America are coordinating with social service agencies in Moldovia, Poland, and Romania to help save Jews in Ukraine. *The Times of Israel* reports that crises management teams at Hillel Poland and the Warsaw Jewish Community Center are working day and night saving Jews.

Odessa, a city of over a million people, now has only 45,000 Jews. Contrast that with the year 1900, when more than a third of Odesa's population was Jewish. The Jewish community of Odessa was decimated in the Holocaust. Yet Russian propaganda now has the gall to claim their current invasion is a campaign to "de-Nazifiy" the territory. And white supremacists in the United Sates posted that Russia and Ukraine are caught in a "ZOG" war (code for Zionist Occupied Government) where "whites lose and Jews win." These insulting lies cannot disguise that, once again, Jews have been forced to flee.

Several years ago, Temple Beth Am "adopted" the Tikvah Children's Home in Odessa, whose mission is to provide aid and education to at-risk Jewish children and impoverished families. As Russian bombs were falling near the Tikvah Children's Home, Rabbi Baksht, who runs the operation, decided it was time to get out. So, at great expense, he transported nearly 300 children to Romania. Rabbi Baksht was quoted as saying "we had a great miracle that we got out of there on time."

All these children are safe, living in a camp facility. The plan is to move them all to Israel.

You should feel proud that Beth Am made a difference. When **Rabbi Barras** sent a letter asking for support, our congregation raised over \$200,000 to help defray the cost of this important, life-saving operation.

And the costs are continuing to mount. Buses typically rent there for \$800, but because of price gouging, it cost \$35,000 to undertake the transport. Through the funds we raised, these children are now being fed and clothed. They even just purchased 50 heaters to keep the children warm. But these children are still in need of medical care and mental health services. The psychological damage of being uprooted may take years to heal.

In *Fiddler*, they sang about their little town, underfed and overworked, where Sabbath was nevertheless so sweet:

Soon I'll be a stranger in a strange new place,

Searching for an old familiar face

We are going to make sure the children of Tikvah Children's Home do not suffer as strangers. Our mission is to make them feel safe and secure.

And we should always make strangers feel welcome, regardless of where they are from, for we were once strangers. Beth Am made two refugee families from Afghanistan feel a sense of community right here in Miami. A team from Beth Am met them at the airport, provided housing and clothes, and got the children enrolled in school. I met one of the families at our Purim Carnival. A little boy (translating for his family) told me how happy he was living safely in Miami. I left by making a heart shape with my hands. They all did the same.

Thank you to **Margie** and **Mark Buchbinder** and the Social

Justice Committee for these acts of Tikkun Olam. For those two Afghani families, you made their world and ours a better place.

We will always be there to make the world a bit more kind. That is what we do as Jews.

I am proud of you, Beth Am. Way to go!

Camp Jenny is a teen-led camp experience for students from an under-resourced school in inner-city Atlanta, GA.

Camp Jenny will be held at URJ Camp Coleman for the first day and then at the Davis Academy in Atlanta for the second day. The Camp Jenny experience has been an integral partnership between NFTY and the students of F.L. Stanton Elementary. With education as the cornerstone of success, Camp Jenny has provided a critical incentive for increased student attendance, parent participation, and academic performance at school. This experience is completely programmed and led by teens from youth groups across the





DAY SCHOOL

This month, our community will celebrate Pesach. At Rambam Day School, our *middah* of the month is aptly "Seder." The Hebrew word "Seder" literally means "order." The Passover Seder is a highly structured meal full of many rituals. Not surprisingly, therefore, structure is a key part of this *middah*.

We lead busy lives. As we begin to emerge from the pandemic, we find ourselves back to long days of shuffling through carpool, work, sports, and chores. Our children allocate their time among activities, homework, and playdates. How much time should we budget for each task? How do we choose one undertaking over another?

How can we use this *middah* to help us in our everyday lives?

As Jews, we interact with the physical world with intention. The *middah* of order helps us to set priorities so that we can accomplish the goals that are most important. Without order, we are pulled in many directions, and we diminish our ability to focus on our highest priorities. Rabbi Simcha Zissel Ziv of Kelm famously compared order to a clasp of a pearl necklace. He said that "If there is no clasp, all the pearls will be lost, and similarly, if a person lacks 'Seder,' many of the qualities that they have nurtured can be lost."

For many of us, a major obstacle in achieving seder is that we are too overloaded with our "to-do" lists. Part of observing this *middah* is to balance our activities while holding onto commitments and priorities that are dear to us.

At Rambam, we teach our students the value of setting goals and making priorities. For example, a child may want to spend more time playing a video game because he or she finds it the most rewarding. But if they delay their homework—a less rewarding responsibility—they will have to face the consequences of an unfinished assignment. On the other hand, say a child is having a meaningful conversation with a grandparent. If the child cuts off the conversation at a critical moment because time is up, they may be missing out on an opportunity that cannot be replicated. Seder requires us to balance. Teaching our children to balance—to determine what is truly vital and what is optional—and modeling that behavior ourselves, can help children develop executive functioning skills, achieve long-term goals, and make their lives easier as they enter into adulthood.

So as we enter this Passover season, let us try and think about making the most of our time using the value of order.

We'll explore these and other topics as we create this sacred space together.







For more than six decades, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (the RAC) has worked to educate, inspire, and mobilize the Reform Jewish Movement to advocate for social justice. RITUAL REMINDERS

Here is YOUR monthly opportunity to perform the mitzvah of Jewish ritual!

PASSOVER

Passover, or *Pesach* in Hebrew, is a major Jewish holiday that celebrates the exodus of the Jews from slavery in Egypt. The holiday begins each year on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of *Nisan* and is celebrated for eight days (seven in Israel). This year, the Hebrew date corresponds with our calendar date of Friday, April 15th (Tax Day!) and ends the evening of Saturday, April 23rd.

We celebrate Passover each year as a remembrance of when G-d delivered the Jews from the Egyptian pharaohs, and to remind us of the presence of G-d. Exodus 12:14-15 states: "This day shall become a remembrance for you and you shall celebrate it as a festival for G-d; for your generations, as and eternal decree shall you celebrate it. For a seven-day period shall you eat matzos, but on the previous day you shall nullify the leaven from your home."

Every year, Jews around the world conduct a *seder* (meaning "order") on the first evening of the holiday, as we remember and tell our children and grandchildren of the exodus out of Egypt. Future generations of the Jewish people must always be aware of how God freed the slaves who became the ancestors of the Jewish people today.

The *seder* is a blending of religious rituals, food, song, and the telling of the Passover story, and it is all done in a particular order. That order is set forth in the *Haggadah*. In addition to the order of the *seder*, the *Haggadah* contains prayers, songs, explanations of the various Passover symbols, and, most importantly, the telling of the Passover story of how G-d freed the Jews from Egyptian slavery. The Hebrew word *Haggadah* actually means "telling." A great deal of the text is quite ancient, the earliest of which precedes the Middle Ages (which began around 476 CE) by several centuries.

A brief summary of the *seder*. Everyone is seated around a dinner table where a leader will conduct the seder. A number of items with symbolic importance will have already been placed on the table. One item always placed on the table is the seder plate, a version of which many of our children made in Sunday School when learning about the holiday. The plate has a collection of items symbolic of the Passover story, among which include the following: a roasted lamb shank bone, which represents the Pascal lamb from which the Jews obtained the blood they smeared over their doors so that the Angel of Death would "pass over" their houses; bitter herbs, such as horseradish, which represent the bitterness of slavery; charoset, a mixture of apples, walnuts, and wine, which represents the mortar used by the slaves to make bricks to build palaces and temples for the Egyptians; parsley, which symbolizes spring (the season for Passover), new beginnings, and the circle of life; and a roasted egg, which represents new life and rebirth.

Also placed on the table is a plate with 3 pieces of *matzah* (unleavened bread). *Matzah* represents the bread that the Jews took with them when they fled Egypt with Moses, as they had no time to bake the bread and let it rise. Salt water is placed on the table in which to dip the parsley before everyone eats a small piece as a reminder of the tears shed by the slaves in captivity. The *seder* calls for each person to drink four cups of wine. Younger children will be served grape juice, but children old enough may be permitted four small cups to their great delight. There is one cup of wine placed on the table that is reserved for the prophet Elijah, whose spirit is said to visit every *seder*. Part of the service involves everyone standing while someone, usually a young child, briefly opens the front door to invite Elijah's spirit into the house.

One of the most endearing rituals of the *seder* is the asking of the "Four Questions" in Hebrew, generally done by the youngest person who is capable of doing so. The questions are prescribed and ask why the rituals of the *seder*, which command behavior so different from other nights, are observed. Why is this night different from all other nights? Why do we dip parsley in salt water? Why can we only eat *matzah* and no other leavened breads or crackers? Why do we eat bitter herbs? Why do we all eat in a reclining position? The answer to the last one is that during the days of slavery, only the wealthy Egyptians could relax and dine in a leisurely manner, while the slaves had to eat their meager meals quickly. The answers to the other questions have been discussed above.

Finally, the *seder* is split roughly into two services with a Thanksgiving-style meal sandwiched in between. Sometime during the meal, the leader of the service will surreptitiously hide half of a piece of *matzah*, called the *Afikomen*. This was ceremoniously broken off of the middle piece of the three pieces of *matzah* placed on the table. Following the meal, and prior to resuming the *seder* service, the children search for the hidden *Afikomen*, and the finder gets to sell it back by "negotiating" with the leader (usually some sort of prize in exchange for the *Afikomen*). Once the leader "purchases" back the *Afikomen*, it is broken into small pieces. Everyone receives a piece to enjoy as the symbolic dessert to the wonderful meal that has been enjoyed by all.

Once the post-meal service is concluded, everyone "looks forward" to seven more days of *matzah* serving as the only "bread" that can be eaten. And, although recognizing that there are still places in this world where the freedom of Jews is threatened, everyone feels inspired by the Passover story and hopeful that one day Jews everywhere will live in freedom.

Time for Tanach, After the Torah

The Book of Isaiah

The book of Isaiah contains sixty-six chapters. According to tradition Isaiah wrote all of these chapters, the last twenty-six of which forecast events that would occur in the future. Many scholars, however, believe that the latter part of the book, chapters 40-66 was written later by another prophet who probably lived in Babylonia around the time that country was conquered by Cyrus of Persia, about 545 B.C.E.

About Isaiah

Isaiah is identified as the son of Amoz, and he lived and prophesied in Judah, the southern kingdom. He was born in Jerusalem to a royal family. He was influential with the rulers and political leaders of the country. Even the kings, Ahaz and Hezekiah, turned to him for advice. He was active for about forty years, 740 B.C.E to 700 B.C.E. Isaiah lived during a time of great national crises. Assyria dominated the eastern part of the area, and he had witnessed the fall of the northern Kingdom of Israel. Judah was caught between Assyria and Egypt. He warned the king to keep free of all entangling alliances with foreign powers. He stood for complete neutrality. He believed that if Judah's national life was pure and righteous, it could keep out of the wars of that age. He was convinced that too much foreign influence would bring foreign religions and worship to Jerusalem.

Names of his sons

Isaiah was married and had two sons. He gave them unusual names that were symbolic of the ideas he believed in. One son he called *Maher-shalal-hash-baz*, speed-booty-hasten-prey. It was a name that warned that Assyria, a cruel and powerful foe, was planning to loot Judah and attack like a lion on its prey. The other son he called *Shear-Yashub*, a remnant will return. This was symbolic of his belief that no matter what disasters might overtake Judah, a saving remnant would survive.

Message of Holiness

Isaiah wrote about the holiness of God. God's holiness was to be found wherever the people practiced mercy, righteousness and justice. God was not to be worshipped only by sacrifices. God sought goodness and right conduct. In the midst of a greedy and corrupt generation and a cruel warlike world, he dreamed of a Golden Age in the days to come.

"And it shall come to pass in the end of days,

That the mountain of the Lord's house shall be Established as the highest mountain, And shall be exalted above the hills. All the nations shall flow to it,

And many peoples shall go and say:

Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord,

To the house of the God of Jacob, That He may teach us His ways, And we will walk in his paths.

For out of Zion shall go forth the Law,

And the word of the Lord from Jerusalem."

His vision of universal peace is described in this famous quote:

"And they shall beat their swords into plow shares, and their spears into pruning hooks;

Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

Isaiah believed that there would always be a saving remnant of the Jewish People who would return to Jerusalem and to the way of holiness. God would assemble the dispersed of Israel from the four corners of the earth, and they would rebuild Jerusalem.

Second Isaiah, Isaiah of the Exile

Isaiah of the Exile wrote about the vision of the return of the people to Jerusalem with inspiring words. They brought comfort and encouragement to the people of Babylonia, especially those who were returning when King Cyrus of Persia gave them permission to rebuild the Temple in Jerusalem.

"They shall build houses, and inhabit them; And they shall plant vineyards, and eat the fruit. They shall not plant, and another eat; For as the days of a tree shall be the days of My people, And My chosen one shall long enjoy the work of their hands. And all your children shall be taught of the Lord, And great shall be the peace of your children."

God of the World

Isaiah of the Exile taught that God is the Creator and Guide of the whole world and of all nations and peoples. God is also found in the heart and spirit of each human being. He believed that all humanity is really one universal family. These ideas have influenced and shaped the minds and thoughts of people about God and humankind throughout the ages. Almost all religious writers and philosophers have expanded on the words of Isaiah.

How relevant are the words and visions of Isaiah for our time! They remind us of our responsibility to strive to bring about justice, truth and peaceful discussions to ensure that all nations and peoples will care for the poor, the oppressed and learn to accept the diversity of opinions with an attitude of civility. As we prepare to celebrate Passover this month, we remember the messages of the Haggadah, from darkness to light, from sorrow to joy, from oppression to freedom.


