#### The Importance of Sticking Together

A few weeks ago, we read the story of the golden calf in the Torah portion of Ki Tissa. Before Moses returned from the peak of Mt. Sinai, the Israelites at the base of Mt. Sinai were concerned that Moses had died and would be leaving them in the wilderness leaderless. In that moment of fear, a handful of ringleaders stirred the masses to give up on Moses and consider an alternative leader. They decided ultimately to fashion a calf out of gold and proclaim that it was now their leader. They proclaimed with great ferocity, "This is your god O Israel who brought you out of the land of Egypt." The male members of every tribe, except Levi, embraced the idol and turned their backs on the principles of Torah that Moses espoused.

When the mob erroneously deduced that Moses was not returning, they turned immediately to his brother Aaron asking him to help find a replacement for Moses. Fearful of the angry crowd before him, Aaron attempted to stall them. He ordered them to collect gold and silver from their wives and children, thinking that they would protest and not allow their precious items to be used for idolatry. Aaron's hope was that while they were trying to convince their family members to part ways with their valuables, Moses would return and put an end to such behavior. His plan failed when the men decided to rip the gold and silver away from their wives and children with such alacrity that Moses still had not yet descended.

Keen observers of the text will wonder why Aaron was not punished for his participation. Instead of employing stall tactics which ultimately failed, could he have not demanded the men stop their lust for idolatry and refocus their attention on the return of Moses? Should he not have risked his own life to try and prevent the construction of the golden calf?

One thoughtful notion that might explain why Aaron is never punished for his role in the episode of the golden calf considers Aaron's possible ulterior motive. If the masses believed that Moses was not returning, they may have given up on the enterprise of Torah altogether. They might have left the mountain and gone their separate ways. They might have splintered into various groups that would put an end to the idea of a people of Israel before it ever began. Aaron's role was to keep the people at the mountain. He needed to engage them and keep them together until Moses would eventually return with the mitzvot and instructions for the future.

Even in the most difficult times, when we are confused and unsure what the immediate future holds for us, what remains sacred above all is the requirement for our community to stick together. No matter what adversity we face, dealing with that uncertainty together through the lens of our tradition will ensure that we will continue to survive and thrive as another link in the chain of our eternal people.

#### Purim 2022: A Holiday of Giving and Gratitude

In 2005, I lived in Israel and had the opportunity to celebrate Purim in the streets of Tel Aviv. Purim in Israel is the equivalent of celebrating New Year's Eve and Halloween simultaneously. The streets are flooded with people in costumes dancing to joyous music and spreading the mission of Purim: "feasting and merrymaking" (Esther 9:22). There are four mitzvot that we are commanded to do during Purim: *Seudah* (Festive Meal), *Megillah* reading, *Mishloach Manot* (Sending Gifts), and *Matanot La'evyonim* (Gifts to the Poor).

This year we can place the emphasis on the two mitzvot of Purim that are usually overshadowed by the spiel and carnival: *Mishloach Manot* and *Matanot La'evyonim*. Joy is an essential value to all Jewish celebrations, and on Purim we express our joy by sharing with others. The Book of Esther (*Megillah*) reads: "They were to observe them as days of feasting and gladness, and as a time for sending gifts to one another, and to the poor" (Esther 9:22).

#### Mishloach Manot (the sending of gifts of food to friends):

is a wonderful way to remind our friends and family that we appreciate them. The gifts can include fresh and dried fruits, hamantashens, jams, nuts, and other delicacies that you want to share. Our tradition urges us to send gifts to every member in the community—so that every member feels loved.

**Families:** You can involve your children and grandchildren by decorating cards, baskets, and bags for the *mishloach manot*. You can also have them bake hamantashens. Delivering the gifts is a great way for kids to exercise the "giving muscle." We can help our children practice this by looking friends and family in the eye, offering a gift with a smile, and trying to reap a reward from the other person's gratitude. We can practice giving without expecting anything in return, and we can practice being thankful if we receive a gift.

**Pro Tip:** This year, venture away from hamantashens with prunes and poppyseeds by searching the internet for new and interesting hamantashens recipes (e.g., salted caramel, gingerbread with apple filling, peanut butter brownie, and strawberry cheesecake).

*Matanot L'evyonim* (giving to the poor): The *Shulhan Aruch* (Orach Hayyim 694:1–4) teaches us that it is our obligation to give at least two gifts to two poor people; and furthermore, we should give to anyone who stretches out their hands. If there is no one in need, we should save our gifts for the next time we see someone in need. This mitzvah transforms our community from one of comfort to one of generosity.

**Families:** In this moment of Purim, where we celebrate and revel in being saved, we also remember that there are those around us who don't have what we have. Young children can participate by dropping coins into a tzedakah box and making donations of food and clothing to a local pantry or shelter. Older children can decorate their own *tzedakah* boxes and vow to add money each week as part of their shabbat ritual.

**Pro Tip:** Participate in this *mitzvah* by including another family or friend. When we give *tzedakah* together, we build meaning and depth into our relationships.

Sharing gifts and giving to those in need ensures that those around us feel comforted and appreciated, further impeding Haman's ("Boo!") plans.

May we all experience the true "spirit" of Purim this year. I am looking forward to sharing a hilarious *Megillah* reading and a joyous outdoor celebration of Purim with the Beth Am family!

#### Martin Luther King, Jr. said: "Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that."

We seem to be surrounded by hatred. Neo-Nazis marched in Charlottesville. The Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh was attacked. President Obama said at the time, "We grieve for Americans murdered in Pittsburgh. All of us have to fight the rise of anti-Semitism and hateful rhetoric against those who look, love or pray differently." Then in Poway, California, another synagogue was attacked. And just recently, yet another anti-Semitic attack on a Jewish institution when a gunman took hostages during a Shabbat service at a temple in Colleyville, Texas.

According to the Anti-Defamation League, the number of anti-Semitic incidents in the United States has increased 26% just in the last year!

Rabbi Greengrass published a letter to the editor of The Miami Herald in January saying, "No Jew should ever feel afraid walking into a Jewish institution, much more a place of G-D."

We are blessed to have Sharon Levi leading our security team. He is regularly in contact with local, state, and national law enforcement to make sure we are as safe as can be. While we do not discuss publicly the details of our security, you should know we have the latest technology to help protect us from an anti-Semitic attack. But an attack on any Jew is an attack on all of us. As Dr. King also said, "We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." Shortly before COVID hit, I saw two swastikas painted on a wall near the courthouse in downtown Miami. A courthouse where justice is supposed to be done. And in our own community, anti-Semitic flyers were dropped off at various places in Miami Beach, Surfside, and Fort Lauderdale a short while ago.

Anti-Semitism in this country is not new. President William Howard Taft famously commented, "Anti-Semitism is a

noxious weed that should be cut out. It has no place in America."

But is Dr. King right? Do we really drive out this hate with love?

Can we really be expected to love the people who express such hatred? I'm not sure. But we can love being Jewish. We can embrace our faith more intently. We can recommit to upholding the principles of Torah. We can lead moral, ethical, and just lives. We can treat all others as we wish to be treated. And we can love our mission to help repair the world.

Rabbi Barras recently taught us in Torah class (if you do not attend, you are really missing something special) that we have an obligation as Jews to teach others about Torah. The Torah commands us to do mitzvot- and through these mitzvot we have a significant, positive impact on our world.

And Beth Am has an extremely active Tikkun Olam Committee performing mitzvot all the time. They do so much good, yet many of our congregants have no idea how to help. Please reach out to our Tikkun Olam Chair, Shelley Jacoby, or our Board VP of Tikkun Olam, Judy Cowan, and find out what part you can play. Help repair our broken world. Or in Dr. King's name, help spread the love.


And if we, and Jews all over the world, begin to get involved, then maybe Dr. King's dream can become a reality. I certainly pray so.

Every year, our Confirmation class travels to Washington, D.C. to participate in the *L'Taken* Social Justice Seminar. For years, if not decades, Temple Beth Am has participated in this program, designed to expose our teens to a variety of public policy issues and explore the Jewish values that inform the Reform Movement's advocacy around these issues.

Unfortunately, Covid continues to bring disappointments, and, in late January, we learned that the *L'Taken* seminar was cancelled for the second year in a row.

We know that teen trips are significant experiences that bond the class together and create truly special memories. We did not want to let our teens down, again. So, instead of a Washington, D.C. experience, we planned a social justice trip to Memphis, one of America's top destinations when it comes to the Civil Rights movement and racial justice.

Memphis beautifully tells the story of the American South. It is famous for its rich culture, pioneering in many aspects of music and art. The city has played a profound role in soul, blues, gospel, and Rock-n-Roll music. Many musical legends started their recording careers in this city. Memphis has played a major role in the anti-slavery and civil rights movements. Due to the thriving cotton industry, the city attracted many enslaved African-Americans, changing the city's face and making it one of the pioneers in the anti-slavery movement.

Our weekend will include a VIP visit to the National Civil Rights Museum and the Lorraine Motel where Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated (we are grateful to Rabbi Greenstein from Temple Israel in Memphis for leading this tour). The Slave Haven Underground Railroad Museum, another landmark commemorating the fight for civil rights, offers a journey through history, serving as a refuge to those trying to escape slavery. We will celebrate Shabbat with Temple Israel and their youth group, enjoy Havdalah by the banks of the Mississippi River, and tour Crosstown Concourse, a modern hub using arts and culture as a catalyst for change. Of course, our trip would not be complete without tasting Memphis' unique barbecue!

Our trip has attracted not only our current Confirmation class, but last year's as well. We have a solid group ready for an amazing adventure. If you don't see us in the building from March 3 to March 6, you know where to find us! Memphis, here we come!


#### The Festival of Joy



## DAY SCHOOL

Dear Friends,

Enrichment Day has always been a wonderful piece of the Rambam curriculum in which students participate in an organized day dedicated to exploring a new topic or skill through hands-on, collaborative projects. The themes of these days have run the gamut from exploring different types of media to Rube Goldberg projects to students putting their own spins on beloved fairy tales. Enrichment Day unleashes the students' creativity and allows them to work together to increase their depth of learning and give them a deeper understanding of a new topic.

This year, our students in kindergarten through fifth grade took part in their first ever STREAM Enrichment Day. STREAM Enrichment Day integrated the subjects of science, technology, religion, engineering, art, and mathematics—along with other subjects such as music and library—into one magical day celebrating the theme of nature in honor of Tu BiSh'vat. Basically, this was the mother of all Enrichment Days, and let me tell you: it was nothing short of spectacular.

Students spent the day working in groups to create nature-inspired projects using materials found in their own neighborhoods. Kindergarteners designed mazes with twigs, stems, leaves, and flowers. They created a code for Colby the Coding Mouse to make its way through the maze. First graders learned about gravity and how it applied to creating and testing their very own parachutes. Second graders learned about the water cycle and built their own water clocks. Third graders learned about solar energy. They constructed and tested their very own solar oven. Fourth graders created their own terrariums after learning about biospheres and how they promote life on Earth. Fifth graders studied birds and crafted their own birds' nests. They tested the strength of their nests by dropping them from various altitudes to see if they were able to hold eggs safely inside. Students had the opportunity to view the projects in the other grades and even cheered their fellow students on as they tested their work product.

STREAM Enrichment Day is the perfect example of Rambam's educational philosophy on full display. Students collaborated and used critical thinking to problem solve and tackle the tasks at hand. Each child was able to contribute their own unique strength, imagination, and voice to accomplish something they could be truly proud of. It was not only a fun, collaborative effort, but it inspired the students to work together to organize their thinking, develop strategies, test ideas, formulate plans, and incorporate art and design. We even integrated sing-a-longs and stories. And all of this was done while celebrating our Jewish values and honoring our beautiful planet. STREAM Enrichment Day seamlessly blended general studies with Judaic studies while encouraging values such as industriousness, inclusion of others, respect, and protecting the environment.

Rambam's dedicated faculty and staff were instrumental in ensuring that STREAM Enrichment Day went off without a hitch. It is because of them that we are able to pursue these magnificent out-of-the-box aspects of our curriculum. ## MESSAGE FROM Our Sister Congregation

I write these words less than two weeks after the shocking events in Colleyville, Texas and just days after the reports of anti-Semitic flyers distributed in South Florida. Know that your extended family at Kehilat Har-El in Jerusalem sends of our members, rushed to update our website as well as the sign outside the synagogue (since we often have walk-ins), and moved services to Zoom for the weekend. Lucky for everyone, and due greatly to strictly following all the Covid

our thoughts, prayers, support, and a COVIDfree hug (!) at this difficult time for the American Jewish community.

The continuing pandemic has been, of course, a constant challenge. We were delighted that after a long hiatus, we had enough local bar/bat mitzvah kids who also signed up far enough in advance to hold a bar/bat mitzvah workshop (like

most Israeli Reform congregations, the overwhelming majority of bar/bat mitzvah kids are non-members, and their families register on average only four months before the date). This in-person group workshop, led by Rabbi Ada, is to supplement the one-on-one lessons with me, where parents and children study together subjects such as "Am I an Israeli Jew or a Jewish Israeli?"; "Shma Yisrael, Tallit, and T'filin;" the different streams of Judaism; women and Judaism; an introduction to the Jewish library; and more. As an added bonus this time around, five of the six families were for bat mitzvah ceremonies. This is a very rare occurrence, since in Israel, very few girls choose to mark their bat mitzvah by reading from the Torah, and instead have basically a sweet-sixteen party at age twelve. So, the dynamics of this female-majority workshop created a sisterhood and support network for these girls. Each of the girls is the only one in her class choosing to have a "real" bat mitzvah and not just a party, and one in particular shared how her Orthodox friend was simply bewildered as to how a girl could even fathom to choose to celebrate the occasion by reading from the Torah, let alone at a Reform synagogue. True pioneers, these young women!

Of course, the Omicron variant caught up to us, and a couple of hours after the Thursday workshop, the parents of one the participants shared that she tested positive for Covid. Moreover, that same girl also had her bat mitzvah lesson with me the hour before the workshop in my study. With the exposure so recent, an antigen test wouldn't be accurate before Shabbat came, so Rabbi Ada and I went into isolation, contacted all guidelines during the workshop in our sanctuary and my oneon-one lessons (including masks, distancing, and open windows even when it's close to freezing outside), the following Sunday both Rabbi Ada and I tested negative along with all the bar/bat mitzvah kids and their parents.

As a result, all of my bar/bat mitzvah tutoring is now over Zoom for the next few weeks, and the workshop has become virtual as well. Hopefully, this

will be only temporary until the end of this current Covid wave. But just like when reading Haftarah, one needs to conclude on a positive note (we Jews are eternal optimists). There is a positive spin on this as well. Now that we're on Zoom, more of the parents participated than when we were in person, and it was even easier to get a group picture (see the accompanying photo) since no one had to worry about social distancing!



## **RITUAL REMINDERS**

## THE JOY OF ADAR

We are now celebrating the month of Adar II. You may ask why there is an Adar II. In order for the lunar calendar to match the solar calendar, Passover to fall within the spring, Shavuot to fall within the summer, and Sukkot to fall within the fall, another month is added to the calendar. Therefore, that year becomes a leap year. That additional month is added before Adar and becomes Adar I. A leap year occurs seven times in a 19-year cycle, usually about every 3 years.

Adar is the happiest, most joyous month of the year. Its motto is *Mi'shenikhnas Adar, marbim b'simcha* or "When Adar arrives, joy increases." Purim is celebrated on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of Adar. However, if there is an Adar II, Purim must be celebrated in Adar II, as both Purim and Passover recount the deliverance of the Jewish people, and there is a bond between the two holidays.

We all know the story of Purim and its main characters: King Ahasuerus, Queen Vashti, Haman, Mordechai, and Esther. Every year we are told the story in our Purim spiel. However, there are two aspects we want to touch on: anti-Semitism and empowerment.

Purim means "lots," which meant that the lot in life for the Jewish people was to be destroyed on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of Adar. The reason is that Haman, an advisor to the King, was angry that Mordechai would not bow down to him. However, Mordechai was forbidden to bow down to Haman. A Jew is commanded not to bow down to a descendant of Agag, the Amalekite King, and Haman fell into this category. Because of Mordechai's devotion to G-d and his refusal to bow, Haman became infuriated with the Jewish people. He told the King, "There is a certain people, scattered and dispersed among the other peoples in all the provinces of your realm, whose laws are different from those of any other people and who do not obey the king's laws; and it is not in Your Majesty's interest to tolerate them, and they must be destroyed."

This edict was to occur on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of Adar. This is the first time in history where we start to see anti-Semitism.

When Esther found out about the plot, she knew that she needed to take charge. In order to build up her confidence and strength, Esther asked the Jewish people to fast for three days and nights on her behalf. Come what may, she would go to the King and try to intercede for her people.

Esther's empowerment from the strength of the Jewish people enabled her to intercede. When the King heard of the plot to kill not only Mordechai, the man who saved his life, but his entire nation, he ordered Haman to be impaled at the stake.

Thus, we celebrate the 14<sup>th</sup> day of Adar, as on this day we went from grief to joy. Here is YOUR monthly opportunity to perform the mitzvah of Jewish ritual!

#### There are five mitzvot that you can fulfill for Purim:

- The Fast of Esther This fast is from dawn to dusk. This year it is from 6:17 am to 7:54 pm on March 15<sup>th</sup>.
- Listen to the Book of Esther You can fulfill this by attending Temple Beth Am's Purim Spiel on March 16<sup>th</sup>.
- **3.** Send food gifts to friends This is known as mishloach manot. It is customary to send hamentaschen.
- **4.** Giving charity to the poor This is called matanot la'euyonim.
- **5.** Eat a festive meal.

This year on Purim, let us remember the lot of what was supposed to happen and what actually happened, and let us celebrate with the joy that Adar brings.

OUR JEWISH HERITAG

#### Time for Tanach, After the Torah

#### THE BOOK OF HOSEA

About fifteen years after Amos, a new prophet was heard in the northern kingdom of Israel, during the middle 8th century, BCE. The kings of Israel were involved in the politics of the times between Assyria and Egypt. The people fell back into idolatry, worshipping the images of the Golden Bull and offering sacrifices to the nature deities. Even the priests were not loyal to their tasks. They did not give the people instruction in the Torah or the knowledge of God. They did not raise their voices against the evils that filled the land with corruption, violence and injustice. Israel was collapsing from within. Hosea heard God's message calling him to be a messenger to the people. Hosea's task was to warn the people of the terrible punishment that would follow their evil practices. He spoke of the need of Israel's repentance, and God's love of healing mercy. He believed that if Israel would mend their ways and return to the paths of righteousness and decency, God would forgive them.

#### HOSEA'S STORY

Hosea teaches his message with a story about his personal life. He tells us that God asked him to marry Gomer, a promiscuous woman. This relationship became the metaphor for his message to the people. The text tells us that Hosea and Gomer had three children, but Gomer was unfaithful to him and sought other lovers. Because of his great love for her, he found her in a slave market, being sold by one of her lovers, and he purchased her and took her back home. He expressed God's relationship to Israel through this symbolic marriage. As Hosea had loved Gomer, so God loved Israel. As Gomer had forsaken Hosea for other lovers, so Israel had been unfaithful to God and Torah. But as Hosea could not abandon the wife he loved, God would not destroy Israel, but they would be sent into exile so that they would redeem themselves, and then God would restore them in the land.

#### CONCLUDING MESSAGE

Hosea believed that as he had taken back his unfaithful wife, God would take back Israel, purified through their suffering in exile. God and Israel would be reunited in a relationship of faithfulness and love.

"I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely. Now my anger has turned away from them... And on that day it shall come to pass, That you shall call Me, My husband... I will betroth you to Myself forever, In righteousness and justice, in loving kindness and in mercy." On that day I will make a covenant for Israel... You are My People, and My People shall say, You are our God."

#### THE BOOK OF MICAH

The prophet Micah prophesied during the time of King Hezekiah, 739-693 BCE). This was a time of prosperity and wealth for the kingdom, but it was also a time of greed and unscrupulous competition. After writing most of the first three chapters of his book denouncing sin and predicting punishment, Micah then talks about a future vision for Judah. His quotes are very well known and universal, even though he is speaking to the people of the kingdom.

"But in the last days it will come to pass, That the mountain of God's house will be established... And many nations will come and say: Come let us go up to God's mountain... And he will teach us his ways, and we will walk in his paths. For out of Zion will go forth the law and the word of God from Jerusalem. And he will judge among many peoples, and will decide among strong nations far off, And they will beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not lift up sword against nation, neither will they learn war any more. Each person will sit under his fig tree and vine, and none shall make them afraid."

The other quote that has become universal comes from the times he would preach to the people of Jerusalem:

"God has told you what is good and what the Eternal requires of you...

To do justly, love mercy and walk humbly with your God."

#### THE BOOK OF ESTHER, MEGILLAT ESTHER

It is on Purim we read the book of Esther. It occurs on the 14th of the Hebrew month of Adar. This year we have two months of Adar, so Purim will be in the second Adar, on March 16-17. We are familiar with the story and the customs as we celebrate each year. Yet, the author of the book of Esther wrote many important ideas for us to consider. It is an adult story. Some scholars consider it an historical novel. You can find it in the third section of the Tanach, in the Writings. It is a story of the Jews of Persia living as a minority in a Diaspora hostile community. It is a story of anti-Jewish ideas, It a story that poses many dilemmas. There are many characters, heroes and villains. Yet there is no mention of God directly. I recommend you read Megillat Esther, the original text, and explore the enduring ideas it teaches us.






